Nov. 1, 1908

Dear Family.-

We are now perfectly convinced that even 1912 will beat us, and then we shall be eternally disgraced.

You would have laughed to see Mary [unreadable] — who is secretary — arriving. In the evening we had an organ recital by a wonderful blind organist from London. He was perfectly wonderful. Don't know when I'd gone to a concert I enjoyed more.
