Tonight I am to go over to Frances Cutler's room to see Louise Hamline, one of the Bangor girls I know, and I am awfully anxious to see her again.

Bob can't come tomorrow, but he wrote me an awfully clever note, and I'll ask him again some time. Tomorrow night we have our first Student's Meeting this year, and that is always interesting.

I think my news is about exhausted, but by Sunday I'll hope to have some more!
