Tantra: The Serpent Power

#### The Seminar:

This Seminar focuses on the visionary faculties, the process of self-observation, and the realms of contemplative imagination It explores the tantric tradition through the metaphor of the serpent, which is at once a symbol for the coiled kundalini energy at the base of the spine that can rise through the practice of yoga; and for chthonic powers often labelled as "impure," "inferior" or "dangerous" by mainstream religious traditions. The seminar considers aspects of tantra in its textual context through a close reading of the *Sat Chakra Nirupana* as well as through contemporary lenses of depth psychology and mytho-poetic studies. This seminar is above all, experiential. It involves hands-on meditative and visionary practice and requires students to open to personal engagement (working with the text of one's own life) and modalities of perception that involve imagistic association, awareness of feelings in relation to dream and hypnogogic imagery, noting synchronicities between waking and dream experience, meditation, and visionary incubation practices. This practicum component of the seminar includes the crafting of "inscape" journals, and vision-dream-weaving in smaller groups. Seminar participants need to be committed to all aspects of the course.

#### **Course Requirements:**

- 1) *Regular Attendance* and careful reading of assigned material. Since this seminar only meets once a week, anyone who misses more than one class without a doctor's note cannot receive a passing grade. This includes eight "vision labs" in which students work in smaller groups outside of class time. There are also two guest lectures.
- 2) *Response Papers* that raise specific questions and issues to be considered in class (1-2 pages due Friday night on the Vassar Moodle). You are required to write four papers over the semester.
- 3) *Inscape Journal* containing records of dreams, associations, interpretations, drawings, poems, and other forms of inner work to be handed in once before the mid-term and once at the end of the semester.
- 5) Final Research Paper or Project to be completed by December 1, using at least ten different

bibliographical sources and presented in class (15-25pp).

6) Participation in "Inner Work Group" and attendance at the practicum sessions.
